# Program Model

The 3R Project (housing component) is a three phased residential TC (Therapeutic Community) utilizing a Case Management approach for service delivery.

# The Family Reunification Process

The Re-Entry reunification process is one of the domains designed to address the family support system which has been identified by The 3R program as a critical part of an offender's success in reintegration.



# GOALS OF THE OFFENDER'S REUNIFICATION MEETING

- To better equip families with the best possible skills to aid their love-one's effort to remain arrest free and become self-sufficient.
- Develop and implement solution-focused approaches to achieve desired offender outcomes following incarceration.
- Facilitate a healthier bond between the offender and his support system to maintain appropriate positive support.



# A Four Meeting Process

- The first meeting identifies and/or develops a healthy support system. The meeting's primary focus is the dynamics between the offender and his support systems. Every offender's situation is unique. Difficult situations involving the offender can be sorted through with help from relatives, family friends, and/or social service agencies.
- The second meeting is a follow-up with the Re-Entry team to inform the support system of identified concerns observed from the initial family meeting. The results of the meeting are translated into a plan that addresses the roles and participation of all parties in the offender's reentry.



# A Four Meeting Process

- The third meeting is the discussion of the offender's re-entry plan and expectations from the offender and from the offender's support system
- The fourth meeting is a collaboration of parole and transitional service agency to set guidelines on going home.



It is understood that family members experience great strain with the loss of a love-one to the experience of incarceration. Tirelessly trying different tactics to turn the offender's life back around, family members are a critical part of the process. Often in meetings we find that families have exhausted all resources in efforts to change the offender. Rational, reasonable approaches applied to this irrational, and unreasonable behavior, do not work. In the process of trying to solve the problem of criminal behavior, significant others (family members) unknowingly become "enablers" and contributors to the problem.

## Do's and Don't list

1. (Do) remain positive
2. (Do) expect change.
3. Don't plead, or demand that they change.
4. Don't try to extract promises that they cannot keep.
5. Don't make threats or ultimatums that you cannot keep.
6. Don't cover up for them, call in sick, or make excuses.
7. Don't believe the unbelievable.
8. Don't make bargains or try to bribe them.

## Do's and Don't list

9. Don't play detective to find out what they have been up to.
10. Don't endlessly present reason and logic.
11. Don't give them a job after they have lost their last job.
12. Don't call them to wake them up in the morning.
13. Don't bail them out of jail.
14. Don't rescue them financially.
15. Don't believe that it is your fault.




